THE DEATHS OF THE FINAL FIVE KINGS OF JUDAH

JOSIAH Judah was under Assyrian control, and Egypt

was coming to the aid of Assyria in its war with Babylon. Josiah sided with Babylon and died in 609 B.C., after fighting against Pharoah Neco in the plain of Esdraelon, near Megiddo (2 Chron. 35:24). His body was

buried in Jerusalem.

JEHOAHAZ Pharoah Neco ruled over Palestine for

several years. He took Jehoahaz as a captive to Egypt in 609 B.C., where he died in exile (2 Kings 23:30–34; 2 Chron. 36:1–4; see

Jer. 22:10–12).

JEHOIAKIM He died in Jerusalem, and his body was cast

outside the city (Jer. 22:18, 19: 36:30).

JEHOIACHIN He was exiled to Babylon in 597 B.C., along

with many nobles, rulers, and artisans (including Mordecai; Esther 2:5, 6). Jehoiachin (Jeconiah) was allowed to leave prison and was given food, clothing, and palace favors for the rest of his life (2 Kings 25:27–

30; Jer. 52:31-34).

ZEDEKIAH In the fall of Jerusalem in 586 B.C. to the

Babylonians, Zedekiah tried to escape but was captured and brought to Nebuchadnezzar, who killed Zedekiah's sons in front of him and then put out his eyes. He was exiled to Babylon along with many others. In fulfillment of the prophecy of Ezekiel 12:13, he did not see Babylon, but died there (Jer. 39:6–8; see 52:11; 2 Kings 24; 25; 1 Chron.

3:15; 2 Chron. 36:10, 11).
